# FOR THOSE OF US WHO... WERE NEVER MEANT TO SURVIVE\*, THIS IS AN HISTORIC OCCASION.

To our knowledge, The Audre Lorde Project is the first successful attempt by our communities to work across gender/racial/ethnic differences to create a Center for the cultural work, social support, health promotion, and political organizing that is critical to our survival. The Project and this Center for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two-Spirit, and Transgender People of Color Communities flow from four rivers:

- born from the legacy of Audre Lorde, from whom we have learned the power of struggle, the value of the erotic, the uselessness of silence and waiting, and the importance of working across differences;
- rooted in a history of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two-Spirit and Transgender people of color in New York City building coalition with each other and maintaining commitment to broader issues of social and economic justice made tangible in the work of the Lesbian & Gay People Of Color Steering Committee and its member organizations;
- catalyzed by a strategic flash of organizing by Advocates for Gay Men Of Color, a group of men who, finding themselves seated at HIV decisionmaking tables and speaking into ears of influence, chose to put that access to the service of broader community building;

• built by the hunger and the energy of scores of community members who, believing we were the ones we'd been waiting for, lent hours of labor and love to what was just an idea; molded by the vision and discipline of a hardworking staff; and buoyed by a growing number of visionary funders.

We have long been underserved or badly served, misrepresented or fetishized, excluded or carded, undervalued or ignored, spoken for or silenced, or told what's good for us. When we have found community, services or attention, it has often been outside of the neighborhoods we call home, or at the price of some other part of ourselves.

In this Center, we seek to create a home for our full selves together, as sister/ feminist/ lesbian/ poet/ activist Audre Lorde has taught us. Sharing space with the Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church, Kitchen Table: Women of Color Press, and the Association of Brooklyn Clergy for Community Development, we see ourselves as stakeholders in the Fort Greene neighborhood and invested in the work of building community across difference throughout New York City. We seek to ensure that our Center is a home for many of us who are nominally part of our community but not truly included — immigrants, young people, elders, people living with AIDS/HIV, and, yes, Lesbians.

Find your place in our new home. Organize and celebrate in its space, recover and rejuvenate in its rooms, and join us in keeping its doors open. Welcome!

## THE AUDRE LORDE PROJECT

#### HISTORY

The Audre Lorde Project (ALP) is a newly-created Center for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two-Spirit, and Transgender (LGBTST) People of Color Communities. Initiated as an organizing effort by a coalition of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two-Spirit, and Transgender People of Color, The Audre Lorde Project was first brought together by Advocates for Gay Men of Color (a multi-racial network of gay men of color HIV policy advocates) in 1994. The vision for ALP grew out of the expressed need for innovative and unified community strategies to address the multiple issues impacting LGBTST People of Color communities. ALP secured and moved into its Fort Greene home, in the parish house of the Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church, during the summer of 1996.

#### MISSION

ALP's mission is to promote and ensure the physical, mental, spiritual, and political health of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two-Spirit and Transgender People of Color in the New York City area.

#### **GUIDING PRINCIPLES**

The principles guiding the work and development of the Audre Lorde Project as a progressive organization seeking social justice are as follows:

Recognizing the full diversity of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two-Spirit, and Transgender People of Color, and our collective histories of struggle against discrimination and other forms of oppression, the Audre Lorde Project has been established to serve as a home base that LGBTST peoples of African/Black/Caribbean, Arab, Asian & Pacific Islander, Latina/o, and Native/Indigenous descent can use to organize, support, and advocate for our diverse communities.

As such, ALP seeks to work with LGBTST people of color organizations and communities across differences of race/ethnicity, culture, gender, sexual orientation, age, ability, and life experiences (e.g. class, immigration status, HIV serostatus, health status, etc.) in order to develop and implement culturally specific and effective programs and services reflecting the needs of our communities.

Understanding that services and organizing efforts are most successful when they involve the communities served, ALP is committed to creating and supporting decision-making/organizational structures that are representative of our communities.

Believing that competent skills and expertise in LGBTST people of color communities exist and are often underutilized, ALP seeks to support and promote the work of existing and emerging LGBTST people of color organizations, as well as the efforts of LGBTST people of color cultural workers and activists.

Finally, as an organization seeking social and economic justice for all peoples, ALP is committed to promoting multi-racial coalition-building, advocacy and community organizing activities among LGBTST people of color, and with allies in struggles for equality and liberation.

### AUDRE LORDE (1934-1992)

**RACISM:** THE BELIEF IN THE INHERENT SUPERIORITY OF ONE RACE OVER ALL OTHERS AND THEREBY THE RIGHT TO DOMINANCE.

**SEXISM:** THE BELIEF IN THE INHERENT SUPERIORITY OF ONE SEX AND THEREBY THE RIGHT TO DOMINANCE.

HETEROSEXISM: THE BELIEF IN THE INHERENT SUPERIORITY OF ONE PATTERN OF LOVING AND THEREBY ITS RIGHT TO DOMINANCE.

HOMOPHOBIA: THE FEAR OF FEELINGS OF LOVE FOR MEMBERS OF ONE'S OWN SEX AND THEREFORE THE HATRED OF THOSE FEELINGS IN OTHERS.

Audre Lorde\*

Undeniably a poet of great stature, internationally acclaimed as an activist, teacher and artist, Audre Lorde was in her own words "Black, lesbian, feminist, mother, warrior, poet" and for many years, "cancer survivor." She was also a theorist and catalyst central to changes in nation-wide feminist curricula, a founding member of Sisters in Support of Sisters in South Africa (S.I.S.S.A.), and a co-founder of Kitchen Table: Women of Color Press.

Recipient of many distinguished awards, and author of numerous books of poetry and prose, her honors included: Honorary Doctorate of Literature, Hunter College (1991); Walt Whitman Citation of Merit (1991); Honorary Doctorate of Letters, Oberlin College (1990); Honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters, Haverford College (1989); Manhattan Borough President's Award for Excellence in the Arts (1988); and she was named New York State Poet Laureate (1991-1993).

Audre Lorde taught us not only through her written work, but her life's example. Her published work and legacy of activism serve as lasting reminders of the various struggles she battled and challenged throughout her life. They also speak to the importance of struggles for liberation among oppressed peoples, and of organizing in coalition across difference. As stated in COLORLife!'s December 1992 issue:

She was there behind the collective consciousness of an entire movement for twenty-five years. Many of us came of age under Audre Lorde's tutelage; her wisdom; her love; her anger... There is little in the way of issues currently discussed that Audre Lorde did not touch. From racism to class analysis, from lesbian motherhood to spirituality, from homphobia in our communities to international solidarity. Nobody wrote poetry like Audre, yet today you might say there is a school of

young poets who found their voice because of her - even read their work with an intonation reminiscent of her own.

Nobody wrote politics like Audre, yet her words have become mantras for activists, poets, novelists, artists, teachers, people with AIDS, cancer survivors. People may have never met her and may have never known a Black lesbian before, but they knew it when they read her work because she always said who she was.

Audre Lorde insisted on changing the shape of the world that impinged on her. As Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two-Spirit and Transgender People of Color united to build and sustain this center to address our various needs, it is no wonder that we have chosen to honor and invoke the name of Audre Lorde.



#### SPEAKERS & PERFORMERS

CARMELITA TROPICANA, the national songbird of Cuba has been sighted in Toronto, Barcelona, London, Chicago and Newark in her solo Milk of Amnesia, published in 1995 by the Drama Review. She is current writing with Ela Troyano a play based on sor juana, the poet nun of Latin America.

DOUG ROBINSON is a longtime advocate for children and education. In June of 1996, he became the first openly gay African American elected to a Community School Board. He is currently the only citywide openly gay person of color in an elected office. In July 1996, he was elected by his fellow board members to secretary of the board. Roblinson and his life-partner of 10 years are the proud parents of two children in third and sixth grades. He was a member of Chancellor Ramon Cortines' Curriculum Outcome committee and former Co-Chair of Center Kids, the family project of the Lesbian and Gay Community Services Center. He was on the executive committee of the Citywide Leadership Parents Group where he spent many hours at the NYC Central Board of Education testifying in support of issues such as multicultural and HIV/AIDS education. He was a member of Mayor Dinkins' Domestic Partnership Policy committee. Doug Robinson is a class parent, former school chair of the computer development committee, and coaches his sons' basketball, baseball and soccer teams in the community.

URVASHI VAID is a writer, attorney and community organizer whose involvement in the gay/lesbian movement spans more than 15 years. Vaid is author of Virtual Equality: The Mainstreaming of Gay and Lesbian Liberation, an analysis of the politics of the gay and lesbian civil rights movement. She is former executive director and former public information director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, where she worked from 1986-1992. From 1983-1986, Vaid worked at the American Civil Liberties Union's National Prison Project, suing prisons to improve conditions of confinement. In 1995, A MAGAZINE, a national Asian monthly, named her one of the 25 most influential Asian Americans, and in December 1994, Time magazine named her one of 50 leaders for the future under 40 in the United States, and one of 100 leaders internationally. Urvashi Vaid was born in New Delhi, India, and now lives in New York City. She is a graduate of Vassar College (1979) and Northeastern Unversity School of Law (1983).

MURIEL MIGUEL is a founding member and artistic director of Spiderwoman Theater. She is also a founding member of Open Theater, Off The Beaten Path, Thunderbird American Indian Dancers and The Native American Theater Ensemble. As a member of Spiderwoman Theatre, a company that has toured internationally, Ms. Miguel has been instrumental in the development of over 20 shows in the last 17 years. She has worked extensively with Native American youth, developing and directing a project for the Minnesota American Indian AIDS Task Force in 1991 and also co-directing INDIAN GIVERS, a play created by the Native American Youth Council of New York City. This year Ms. Miguel was selected for the Native Women of Hope Poster. She is currently working on her new ecology theater piece TRAIL OF THE OTTER, for which she had a residency at Banff Center for the Arts in Alberta, Canada.

ANDIE MONTOYA-MONTES is a queer-identified 20-year-old native of Colombia, South America. Presently enrolled at Hunter College. His interests are in the fields of sociology and media. He has been involved in the queer youth, multi-media, performance group "School's Out: The Naming Project" since the fall of 1994. With "School's Out" Andie has performed for The New Museum of Contemporary Art, Dance Theatre Workshop's "Bessie Awards", The Center for Lesbian and Gay Studies (CLAGS), and various other performance spaces throughout the city.

Her work has appeared in Through the Cracks, Sinister Wisdom, Common Lives, Lesbian Lives, Rag Shock; African Voices, and Father Poems. In 1995, she was the recipient of grants and fellowships from the Barbara Deming Money for Women Fund and The New York Foundation for the Arts. Her work focuses on the connections and intersections of what it means to be a lesbian of color in America today.

CHERYL BOYCE TAYLOR is a poet whose work has been featured in ALOUD: Nuvorican Poets Anthology, The Maryland Poetry Review, and In Defense of Mumia. Ms. Boyce Taylor earned her BA in Theater along with Masters degrees in Education and Social Work.

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

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

People Of Color Pride Weekend at The Center*; previous "Orientations to Lesbian and Gay People Of Color Organizations"; "Our Future In The Fusion?", the December '93 Joint Town Meeting with representatives from the NYC mayoral administration; "Eat-In/Teach-In: A Community Observance of 500 Years of Resistance and Survival"; "Everybody Dance Now!," "Harvest Feast," and "New York Style Barn Dance" joint fundraisers for all the organizations within The LGPOCSC; various joint outings and parties; and the Annual Lesbian and Gay People of Color and Friends Picnic during June Pride Month. In addition, The LGPOCSC coordinates the yearly People Of Color Contingent within the Pride March, as well as the Joint Exhibiting of People of Color organizations in the "PrideFest."
