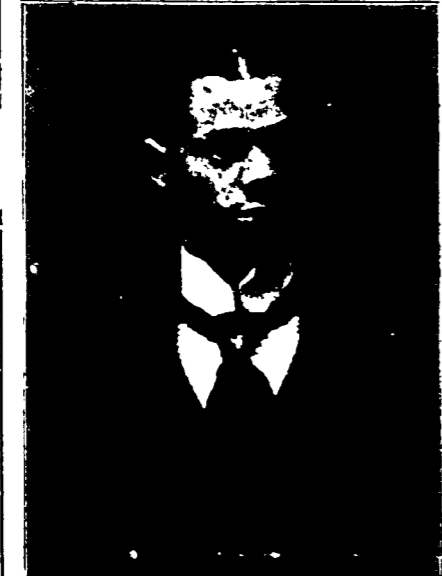

When salaries came due and the box office receipts were not enough to pay salaries, the owner of the ranch would write his son, who was in charge of the hog business, and order enough hogs to be sold so as to keep the company from becoming stranded. This lasted until the ranch owner had about 20 hogs left when the show closed, and Williams and Walker were again looking for work. They met with reverse after reverse and knocked about from place to place and finally drifted into Chicago. Here the pair met with its first success. Thomas Canary, of Canary & Lederer, of the New York Casino fame, met them, and after seeing their turn, decided to engage them for the elaborate production of "The Gold Bug," which opened in New York, September 14, 1894. Their act was the feature of the show and in a short time offers began to pour in tendering engagements at leading theaters in the country.

Their next success was with Peter Daley in "A Good Thing," and then came their banner engagement of their career—thirty-six consecutive weeks at Koster & Bial's, New York, at \$300 a week. Next the team crossed the Atlantic and showed for eight weeks at the Empire Theater, London. A return American date at Koster & Bial's lasted five weeks, when Hartig, Seamon & Tuck placed them at the head of a company, where they have been and are still changing the play each season.

When playing in different cities they stop at the leading hotels, taking their meals in private apartments to avoid remarks by white guests who might object to their presence. Both are possessed of a pleasing personality and avoid the white people as much as possible. Lottie Thompson, who played the old maid in "The Policy Players," in private life is Mrs. Bert A. Williams, and Ada Overton, who played Kioka, is Mrs. George W. Walker.



J. Harry Martinette,
Saxophone soloist, was born December 24, 1869, at Knoxville Tennessee. He spent all the young part of his life in and around there, unfortunately losing his mother at the age of four years. But having a father to see and care for him, was sent to school and received a fair education after which in 1882 he commenced to learn the tinners trade and served two years and three months at that. From that, his father being a barber and owning a large shop he was put in the shop to learn the barber's trade. He remained there quite a while until one day in the Spring of 1886 he left home and went to Chattanooga, Tenn. where he found work and remained for nine months during which time he made his first appearance at East Lake Museum and Theatre as a contortionist. Following this for some time he next commenced to learn music. In 1889 he made his first road trip with Benson & Moore's All Star Specialty Co., being stage manager. With this company he had a partner and they went by the name of Harry Martin and Billy Campbell, the Monarchs of Song and Dance, only staying out a short time after which he returned home and there he remained taking parts in all the local shows that were given. In March 1890 another show was organized and went out, leaving Knoxville on Monday, March 31, touring Tennessee and Virginia. Leaving this at Roanoke, Va., he joined J. M. Brooks Medical show, May 17 of the same year; leaving this show to go to Pocahontas Va., August 17 to open a variety house for two weeks, after which he returned to the Brooks Medicine show, on Sept. 1. Leaving the Medicine show Saturday, Dec. 20, he joined the Boston Comedy Company going as far South as his home, Knoxville, where he closed and there remained. This was in 1891. On the 29th of July '91, he left Knoxville for Springfield O., where he joined Capt Stewart's Wagon Show. He left this show as the season closed and went to Cincinnati O., on 22 of Oct. 1891 and there he remained a while. Here, as Martinette and Campbell they played one week at Kohl & Middleton's Dime Museum, after which they went South making a tour by themselves as far as New Orleans, La. We next find them returning to Birmingham, Ala., on April, 16, 1892, dissolved partnership with Campbell, and returned to Knoxville and joined hands with J. C. Prosser being known then as Martinette and Prosser. Leaving home he went to Philadelphia the same year. They played around and about Philadelphia

and then, leaving Prosser, he went to Lakewood N. J. and joined J. W. Massengill. On April 23, '93 they joined hands with Prosser, sailing under the name of the Tennessee Trio, Martinette Prosser and Massengill. They went to Saratoga New York for three months, June, July and August, giving concerts in all the leading places of amusement assisted by Peck and Taylor. Leaving Saratoga, Friday Sept. 1, '93 for New York City they joined J. H. Manley's Concert Company, traveling from Portland Maine to the Gulf of Mexico, playing all the large towns and returning to Chattanooga Tuesday, March 20, '94 and there remaining, during which time he organized and led an orchestra, accepting an engagement with J. C. Moore's Tennessee Jubilee Singers in 1895, taking the road in March as Martinette and Prosser, touring, Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana. Mr. Martinette then filled engagements in the following well known organizations: "In Old Virginia" and "The Turkish Knight" company. In 1897 he organized the Martinette and Royston Minstrels for a short tour. In the same year he formed the Plantation Trio—Martinette, Koddy and Wallace in a hot musical act. The following season they joined the Afro-American Specialty Company after which filling good engagements with the Davis Columbian Minstrels, after leaving this company, they played dates in many of the leading museums and vaudeville houses in the East. Securing an engagement abroad they left on July 14, '98, opening at Cambridge and Middlesex England, where they formed a company which is known as the Ex Slave Choir where he is at present. Mr. Martinette is said to be the only colored Saxophone player on the other side of the water. He has received several flattering offers from managers of America but owing to being booked up across the "pond" he was unable to accept. Their success in England has been all that could be expected.
