Very recently a crossdresser was spotted in one of the ladies rooms at Disneyland. When she was apprehended she showed them her therapist's letter which stated the reasons for her to crossdress in public. Nevertheless she was thrown out of Disneyland and her membership privileges at Disneyland were revoked.

A few very notable doctors and attorneys who have been helping the gender community have decided to sue Disneyland for this crossdresser's civil rights. These professionals have agreed

to volunteer their time, talent and energy to what may well become a landmark case in California for your rights. We had been warned that due to the interest usually generated by TVs, the crowd might be larger than usual. There's nothing like walking out on stage in front of several hundred undergraduates and knowing you are on closed circuit television to two other packed lecture halls.

After brief introductions, we opened it up to questions and the professor, John DeCecco, did his best Phil Donahue impression, running up and down the aisles with a microphone. The questions came fast and we did our best to answer with seriousness, grace and humor. Kim disappeared and, after a bit, Jim appeared in her place much to the surprise and delight of the students. We have it all on tape so come to Outreach Night in November and see how well we tried to represent our group. We look forward to your comments and won't wince too much during your criticism.

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## COMMENTS FROM A NEWCOMER

The activities at the Chez seem to be designed more as social mixers than as profound experiences and are mostly at the level of summer camp hi-jinks rather than sophisticated, well-oiled routines. ETVC is run by volunteers and as such is not a "tight ship". What gets done by its members is sandwiched between their jobs, families and the flotsam and jetsam of life's necessities, although for many ETVC appears to be an emotional necessity.

I set for myself the goal of going to at least one of each activity or committee meeting with the intent of learning what each group was all about, who was its leadership (like most such organizations, it is a handful of the hardest working and most dedicated) and going "dressed" to each as a way of testing out how much I wanted or really needed to get dolled up. I don't recommend that everybody do it this way, but that doing it so was a way of finding out in part who I am. I do not know how many other members have needed to use ETVC to explore themselves in this way. Possibly quite a number.

**Dear Renee:** Why is it that when I try to be feminine, I just seem affected and unnatural - like a lot of gay men?

**Dear Swish:** *Crossdressers have no role models but women and drag queens. How can you learn to be natural in a closet? There's nothing wrong with seeming gay, or do I sense a bit of homophobia? I think the only way to unfold your feminine persona is to let go of your idea of what women do, how they talk, etc., and start paying attention to what they actually do, day in, day out, as you would learn an instrument, a sport or a language. The point is not to "pass" so much as it is to stretch beyond the narrow confines society places on men.*

Most of the members do not come dressed to committee meetings, although there is no rule one way or the other. Committees in ETVC are like committee meetings everywhere, work sessions, often dull or tedious, mostly lacking in the "high" one gets from crossdressing.

A thing that surprised me was the number of wives and girl friends who are active in the organization. Anyone can join (although identities are jealously guarded!) Several wives have served as committee chairmen, others just participate in the fun and games of a night at the Chez and still others come to enjoy the social occasions that ETVC provides. They could come alone if they wanted to! A "Significant Others" support group exists because as I understand it our hobby sometimes causes problems for wives and families (I really can't understand why!).

Apparently some ETVC members are gay and while what I have written has been aimed at straight readers, it really applies to gays as well. In any case the organization provides loads of ways of getting involved that are not so scary. Hope to see you there.

**Dear Renee:** My mother is my role model, yet I fear hurting her. Should I tell her ALL about myself? Should I risk shocking her in order to remove the shroud of secrecy that I've had to keep between us? Mama's Girl

**Dear Mama's Girl:** *Test the waters carefully. Make a point of choosing "Tootsie" or "La Cage aux Folles" next video evening. How does she feel about her assuredly gay hairdresser? How did she react to you smoking pot in college? How rigid is she, and how much truth can she handle? How does she deal with her own secrets? It's important to understand that when she grew up, sparing a loved one unnecessary discomfort was a universally approved behavior.*

## A Housewife's Journal by Renee

Mopping floors, washing windows, dusting knick-knacks one by one - is that any way to spend my life? Does my Ivy League degree help me decide which detergent to choose, how to get in the corners with the vacuum cleaner or how to press my lover's silk suit? Shouldn't I be making something of my life, using my important talents to make a difference in the world?

I imagine how the author of "Black Like Me" must have felt: demoted in self-esteem and status to idiot's drudgery, unpaid, unsung and lonely. The goal has become keeping things looking the same, keeping us fed and in clean clothes, success measured in the absence of complaints.

And yet, I love it, I choose it. It is just what I've always dreamed of! I look in the mirror and I see a housewife. Busy day by day caring for her lover's well-being, with no other reward but her appreciation. It is no less meditative than combing pebbles in a zen monastery, no less important than I make it, as satisfying as holding your lover in your arms when she awakes from a nightmare.

I struggle with the world's voice within me discrediting my innermost needs. What would my Father say of me taking pride in a sparkling bathtub? What would

my Mother think of her brilliant son painstakingly pre-washing stains out of blood-flecked sheets? Hardly anyone could understand.

Being a housewife is love in action: nitty-gritty nurturing, focusing on all the little human aspects of your lover's being. Putting away her clothes, buying the breakfast cereal she prefers, making the bed she lies in. Instead of The Job, politics, sports or Money, it is my beloved I think on as I hang up the laundry. Not abstractions but a person. Not a means to an end, but the end itself.

And no longer do life and work diverge at 9 am and 5 pm. There is a continuity with some task always demanding my attention, but no reason not to call a friend or read a magazine for a few minutes either. Everything I do makes perfect sense, so long as I do not judge it petty or beneath my dignity. And since my work is not stressful, I can perform it without pushing myself or delaying small gratifications, i.e., the icebox and sunporch are never far away.

When I think of the hundreds of millions of women worldwide engaged in the selfsame activities as I am, I feel a connection and sense of belonging that goes beyond the physical reality of working alone at home. Mine is a truly universal experience, and even if I cannot give birth or nurse, one that I would not trade for anything.
