TGIC, what is a meeting like?

This article is targeted to those people who have never been to a meeting or don't quite get what it's about having been there once or twice. The rest of you can still read along. The meetings at TGIC amount to the following: A group of quite diverse people in various levels of commitment from cross-dressing part time to full life commitment, transgender or transincluding change sexual of identity. Profession? Pick a letter: engineer, computer sales, diesel mechanic, pilot, farmer, self employed, retired, prison guard, career transitioning (That's me and at least one other person), 20's to 70's, diverse life styles, backgrounds, income levels, world views, traveling distances, some of us regular for the past six years, some now and then over that same time or more (I joined six years ago), some once-in-a-blue-moon occasional to one only and everything in-between. Everything from three people to twenty-some per meeting.

Meetings are unstructured, driven only by the personalities present per meeting. Attempts at more structure than this have met with total failure. Don't argue with success. Why do I say that? Because the meetings have gone on week after week, year after year, consistently (except Thursday holidays or an occasional blizzard), structured only by personalities present thereby giving each participant autonomy to be his/her self in a friendly extra non-judgmental atmosphere. Rules? drugs, no alcohol (except wine at a party), no orgies. Everybody acts civilly with respect for self and others. People who need to act out their instability in a semi-public place will be uncomfortable here. Some have come one time only. Others promise to come and never do for any number of reasons: instability, paranoia, responsive to their fetish-fantasy expectation, can't "break the ice" with new people, who knows? This is the place where

dysfunctional issues are discussed and addressed, but not patronized or encouraged. This includes the old bugaboo, Guilt and shame, and anything else. You have the opportunity to get comfortable with yourself and lose that stuff, not wallow in it.

We know the professional specialists for therapy, medical care, legal issues, and support groups elsewhere.

From what I understand, and this was before I joined in 1992, TGIC was a live wire with lots of club sponsored activities. Today it is a social club with outside activities conducted by members and alumnae independent of TGIC. The face of transgender is changing, and much of the country is on a learning curve, and so are we who are transgendered. We have been accomplishing our goal of educating the public, and guess what? It makes life different for us! Some of the "Safe portable closet" of group activities is giving way to the more open agenda of transgendered people just doing things. Public acceptance is changing. And it's changing us.

Comments, agreements, disagreements are welcome.

I enjoyed the first installment of the story of your transition. I hope your parents are proud of you. Since I'm mostly self-employed and expect to remain so, I'll probably never have such a dramatic transition story.

I was struck that the one issue your supervisors immediately brought up, and apparently wouldn't let go of, was, as Kate Bornstein drily puts it, "Which bathroom is it going to use?" Of all the issues confronting a TS (can I keep my job, will my family reject me, will my friends and lover desert me, can I get appropriate medical care), this one seems to demand a disproportionate share of attention and energy.

Like most T*s, I've had my share of bathroom bad moments, to the point where I think twice about which restroom door I'll walk through. (Thank God/ Goddess for those handicappedaccessible lavatories with the sign for both men and women. Isn't it odd that the only people in this society who are excused from declaring a gender before they relieve themselves are the handicapped? Even babies are stuffed into his and her Huggies.) Why is this such a cultural hang-up? Everyone's

gotta go sometime, several times a day. Why is the fact that some people do it standing up, and some people do it sitting down, so unmentionable that those who prefer one position must never, ever be confronted with the reality that some people do it another way?

Something very primitive seems to be at work here, even beyond what I suppose is women's disinclination to let men see them fiddling with their clothes, re-applying make-up, or dealing with the mess of That Time of the Month. Remember the Equal Rights Amendment? The threat that it would outlaw single-sex bathrooms was enough to scuttle the promise of equal opportunity and equal pay for equal work.

I've been in a number of places where the only restroom was single person occupancy. Everyone took a turn and there were no complaints. Obviously this won't work for places where a lot of people may need to use the facilities at once. Re-plumbing America, so that bathrooms come in trios for men, women, and others, isn't practical or likely. And how many of us would admit to being "other"?

Some of us don't pass very well, and may never pass very well. The restroom wars don't seem to be an issue for most

non-T* people, except when they give us dirty looks, challenge our right to be there, and even chase us out, so this seems to be uniquely our issue to deal with. What are some creative approaches we can take? Are there alternative ways to designate the facilities to include us? How about a campaign to remark doors "for those who really need privacy" and "for those who don't give a fiang"?

I'm also enclosing my nomination for the latest Darwin Awards. You can credit it to Chuck Shepherd's column in the Albany Times-Union.



Dear TGIC members and friends,


I am organizing a commemoration of gays who were persecuted by the Nazis, to be held during the Capital District Pride Week (Sept. 27-Oct. 4). Along with eliminating Jews, Gypsies, people with mental and physical disabilities, Jehovah's Witnesses, Communists, and dissenters of any sort, the Nazis wanted to exterminate men who didn't conform to the Aryan ideal of manliness. An estimated 100,000 men were arrested on suspicion of being homosexual. Some were actually gay. Some were bisexual, transgendered, or cross-dressers. Others were straight victims of false accusations. They were seized from all parts of the Third Reich: Germany, Austria, France, Poland, and other occupied territory. Tens of thousands were sent to concentration camps, and many died under the most horrific circumstances.

I believe that this is part of our history that we need to remember. At the very least, I plan a contingent in the Pride Parade on Oct. 4. Other possibilities are a speech or reading during the post-parade rally, an exhibit at the Gay & Lesbian Community Center, a reading or prayer during the Interfaith Service on Sept. 28, and a dramatic presentation during the Cabaret.

I invite anyone to participate, on whatever level is comfortable. You don't have to be white, gay, or male. I would love to include a few drag queens! I understand funding is available through the Capital District Gay & Lesbian Community Council, so you will not be asked to do any fund-raising. 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
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artists. We'll also have four seminars, two of them by Dr. Sheila Kirk. And, we'll have our world-famous parties, tag sale, and talent show.

Androgyny in New York City

Saturday was perfect for my first day in the City, clear skies, temperature in the 80's. Exiting the Queens-Midtown Tunnel, I drove uptown and parked on Amsterdam Avenue at 68th Street and stuffed the meter with quarters. In a short straight red skirt, white v-neck blouse, white pantyhose, red mid-height heels, red earrings, and white purse, I walked and walked and walked. The streets were packed, musicians on break cluttered about Lincoln Center, vendors and bargain hunters crowded around curbside booths on Central Park South. I wove through the crowds, then ran the gauntlet. A phalanx of NYPD's finest uniformed officers lined the street for three blocks guarding the Essex Hotel where Netanyahu was camped out for weekend events: chats with Madeleine, Kofi, and Rudolph and Sunday's Honor Israel parade. St. Patrick's Cathedral, the southern terminus of my walk, offered cool shade, a wedding, and an Ode to Joy organ recessional. Busloads of tourists streamed in, thickening the faithful throng. After returning to the car by way of Rockefeller Center, Broadway, and Columbus Circle, I bought a cold fruit drink at a deli then slaked my thirst while resting on a bench in a shady park nearby. I drove to 78th Street and walked four long blocks to the American Museum of Natural History. I had forgotten my membership card but the lady at the desk took my name, confirmed my membership status and allowed free entry for three fascinating hours of life and times in Africa, Asia, and South America. Tip for the day: Girls, don't wear new shoes if you are planning to walk all day.

History lesson over, it was time for the present, the cultural and social aspects of NYC. Thanks to Callan and the e-mail list I learned of a recently opened club downtown in Soho at 35 Crosby Street, a block east of Broadway between Broome and Grand. All routes heading south where jammed. I drove down Broadway and through Times Square. Normally I would have been frustrated by the snail's pace, but I was enthralled and enlightened watching the thousands of people swarming about. I learned what women were wearing to dinner, to the opera, to the concerts, to the nightclubs, and shows. Two hours later I arrived.

Androgyny's co-owners Marquesa and David greeted me warmly. Showing up early gave the advantage of their undivided attention to discuss the club and to learn more about city politics and the NYC club scene. As they spoke of what it takes to get a club started, it became clear that Marquesa and David had gone out of their way to score a first for the City, a transexual lounge, extraordinarily comfortable for patrons and girls in particular who may feel uncomfortable in public. Girls enter free from 6-8, time to put faces on in a well-lit changing room. Androgyny features a relaxed atmosphere available to all. I was at home.

The gorgeous Marquesa with her black dress and black high heels inspired me to change from my daytime

attire to my little black dress with rhinestone accents, ultra sheer jet black pantyhose, and very high black heels complimented by rhinestone necklace, earrings and bracelet. From my car parked directly in front, I got my change of clothing and joined Laura in the changing room. It is not hard to find mirrors at the club. Later, Connie, Jean, and Traci joined assorted couples and other singles in the fun and conversation. Jean's electronic camera captured several candids. We lounged in comfortable sofas, munched cheese, dips, raw vegetables, and chips, listened to soft music, and discussed hair removal, nails, high heels, and the extent to which one should use plastic to enhance ones shape.

Beer, soda, and wine are served. Open Thursday through Saturday, admission is \$20 for men and \$10 for ladies after 8 PM. Weekdays, opening is 6, closing at 2 AM, except 4 AM Fridays and Saturdays. Special rates are available for associations. Videos play above the bar, e.g., Priscilla Queen of the Desert and other such fare, no pornography. No dancing. Guests are expected to be discrete. The neighbors don't appreciate loud unruly patrons. Talent nights and theme parties are planned. Parking can't be more convenient, right out front on the street at no charge. The tapas place next door serves good food. The neighborhood is as safe as Androgyny's cheese. You can eat the complimentary cheese without fear of ill effects, David having successfully completed a city-mandated cheese cutting course. He'll demonstrate on talent night.

Androgyny's home page is well constructed with informative crosslinks, bulletin board, sounding board, photo album, event calendar and detailed directions to the club from every conceivable point on the compass. Do visit the site, http://members.aol.com/andro10013. In the photo album you'll find yours truly who managed to get herself into a few of the shots. A sample is below.

Traci stood me a nightcap and with an hour and a half drive ahead of me I chose David's special coffee, black. Home at 4:30 AM. What a great day in the City!. Androgyny is an absolute must. Go! --



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
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TGIC On-Line
