
NEW SOCIAL CONTACT GROUPS

the biological changes that relate to sexuality in both older females and males. Their studies indicate that the myths related to the sexual needs and practices in older people are just that. In older males it takes longer to get an erection but this does not necessarily imply impotence or infertility. In both older females and males there is an increased libido and therefore an increased sexual interest. They advocated a widely disseminated program of understanding these drives in older people, for sex educators and therapists.

The session on Homosexuality and Heterosexuality in Perspective dealt with comparative sexual behavior patterns between selected heterosexual and gay populations, as studied by Masters and Johnson over a period of about ten years.

Using as a basis for this study masturbation, committed couples' interaction, partner stimulation, fellatio/cunnilingus, assigned partners' interactions and post-orgasmic behavior, they compared the "functional efficiences", for both male and female heterosexual and gay populations. While the techniques for measuring these variables are complicated, they were able to conclude the following from their longitudinal studies:

- There is no statistical difference in the functional efficiencies of gay and heterosexual males. In other words, both of these groups were sexually satisfied, using the techniques of masturbation, partner manipulation, and fellatio for gratification.
- There is no statistical difference in the functional efficiencies of gay and heterosexual females. In other words, both of these groups were sexually satisfied, using the techniques of masturbation, partner manipulation and cunnilingus for gratification.
- There is a significant statistical difference in the functional efficiencies of heterosexual males and females. This would imply that, to quote Dr. Masters, "there are problems in how heterosexual males and females interact during coitus." He hints that this may be due to social and cultural pressures in our society.
- Females in both study populations are polyorgasmic whle males are generally not.

Space does not permit detailed discussion of these important findings.

In another session dealing with Sexual Fantasy Patterns for both gay and heterosexual study groups, the context and function of sexual fantasy was discussed.

about my own experience as a crossdresser. I spoke of the anguish, sorrow and pain that I had experienced, as a crossdresser, with no on around to share my feelings and perhaps give me some good advice. I, specifically, told him to avoid further involvement with this behavior, if he could, and that I would be available to discuss and advise and help him regardless of what decision he made. I thought that a strategy of discussion and mutual sharing of feelings would be much more helpful, rather than scolding or ridicule.

Within a month of our conversation, he proceeded on his own course of action. He threw himself into school athletics, so that he did not have idle time to fantasy and crossdress. He asserted himself more, with girls and gradually grew from a nervous shy state to being more comfortable with and enjoying female companionship.

Three years have elapsed since our talk and he has completely stopped crossdressing. In a recent chat with him, he indicated that it was no longer a problem.

I'm not sure that he will never crossdress later in life, but, he will do so with the knowledge that someone close to him is around who cares about him and will understand.

Legal Research Division RENAISSANCE: GENDER IDENTITY SERVICES Post Office Box 2476 Mission Viejo, California 92690 The context of sexual fantasy would include curiosity, externally induced fantasies (books movies, news, etc.), fantasies used to induce arousal, fantasies supplementing arousal, fantasies used to induce orgasm, and solitary fantasies vs. fantasy activity with a partner.

Included in the basic functions of sexual fantasy are a safety valve for anxieties or guilt, the search for self esteem, creative source of imagery and excitement, and personal sexual values.

For the study groups that M/J worked with these are their findings:

- For the heterosexual male or female the following was their fantasy preference:
 - a. replacement of established sex partner
 - b. forced sexual encounters
 - c. recall of past, pleasurable sexual encounters
 - d. sado/masochistic imagery
 - e. cross sex-preference experience

• For the gay male or female the following was their fantasy preference:

- a. forced sexual encounters
- b. idyllic encounters with established partners
- c. cross sex-preference experience
- d. recall of past, pleasurable sexual encounters
- e. sado/masochistic imagery

It was pointed out, explicitly, that these results were obtained by private interviews and questionaires and never were they actualized. From their studies in this area of human sexuality M/J consider the gay experience as a very natural mode of human sexual experience and not a perversion or deviancy.

Throughout the two days of intensive sessions, I was impressed with the rigorous and scientific approach that M/J applied to their studies. They were very careful not to embrace or to offer any "catch all" theories of human sexuality. They humbly admit that their research is but the "tip of the iceberg" in a vastly complex aspect of human behavior. The integrity of their findings is a hallmark of constructive understanding in certain areas of human sexuality. To gain deeper insight into the many implications of the studies, I recommend reading their published works.
