

GIRL LOVERS MARRIED.—Yesterday morning a slender and beardless youth applied at the county clerk's office at Steubenville, Ohio, for a marriage license, giving his name as Augustus Cathon and that of his intended bride as Mary Brinkham. He got the license and went to Toronto, where he met Miss Brinkham, the two repaired to the home of a minister, who having his suspicions excited by Cathon's actions, refused to perform the ceremony. The couple then went to the little town of Empire, where Justice Whitcomb married them. After the ceremony it was ascertained that the "groom" was Sallie Stringer, a native of Jefferson county, who had met Miss Brinkman at a hospital at Columbus, where she was a nurse. Miss Brinkman was about the only one who expressed no surprise at this discovery, and the couple announced they will remove to St. Louis and live together.

Another account of the affair says: "A sensation was created in Toronto, O., yesterday by the marriage of Augustus Cathon to Miss Mary Brinkman, of Quincy, Ill. Cathon had lived in Toronto for years as Sallie Stringer. No one suspected Sallie's disguise, and to all appearances she was a model young woman. She was a clerk in a music store, and received attentions from a number of young men. Before going to Toronto Cathon was an inmate of the Columbus Hospital, where he met Miss Brinkman, who was a nurse. No cause is given by Cathon for his masquerade as a woman.
