AUGUST MEETING REPORT

There were approximately seventy people at the August GPC meeting, including spouses, significant others, one set of parents (!) and 8 newcomers, a great turnout for the middle of the summer.

At every meeting there are always a few veterans who like to sit in on newcomers meetings, myself included. The newcomers group has an energy about it that you don't find in the regular meeting room. In the newcomers space you have people who may be venturing out in public dressed for the very first time, or finally meeting others like themselves for the first time. Angela Gardner (who showed up in drab) sat in at the "new" newcomers meeting, told the attendees about the benefits of membership in Renaissance National, and shared some of the resources that are available through the National Office. Angela said that as the people took turns around the room talking about why they were there, "It took me back a couple of decades to my first meeting. It's been a long time but I heard the same things: isolation, fear of discovery, questions about how to tell loved ones. These are the reasons we started Renaissance in the first place."

In an attempt to bring some of the newcomer group energy back to those who have been attending for a long time Dr. Lee Etscovitz ran a newcomers group for Renaissance veterans called Newcomers Meeting For Old Comers. Questions posed to the group were, what were your concerns when you came to your first meeting, and what are you concerns now. The September program is expected to be a lesson in makeup application from a professional makeup artist/medical esthetician who is familiar with our special needs. Vendor's Night is scheduled for November!

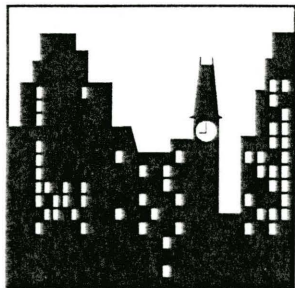
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NOTICES!
