Mean Streets and A Loving Friend

March 26, which was to be our Leather and Lace Social, turned out to be something quite different. Exactly two weeks before, Cameron (Empress XXII Tina) Tanner in full view of standers-by, had been beaten literally senseless by two men with baseball bats. It was a time to grieve for and remember Cameron and to ponder the lessons of his tragedy.

If you attended that evening, you remember the surprise of receiving a metal police whistle on a cord. Why, you may have thought, police whistles? You remember the petition, drafted by Amanda and circulated by Nancy Ann, asking the mayor and chief of police to "do everything in your power to see to it that the individuals responsible are brought to justice." You remember the personal safety lecture by Loretta Whitehead of SAFE (see "Cindy at Large" for details). Most of all, perhaps, you remember the moving talk given by Steve Rascher (Emperor XVI), owner of Lily's, which Cameron Tanner had managed.

We spoke with Mr. Rascher early in April for an update on the friend he had so eloquently eulogized.

"Tina," he said, "though no longer on life support, is still comatose. The prognosis is not very encouraging. She may eventually come out of the coma, but not as the same Tina. There has been severe brain damage."

Had police made any arrests? "No."

Did he think this had been a gay bashing? "Tina had come out from a gay play, so this was not random. The police haven't labeled it a gay bashing, but it doesn't make any difference. It wasn't a love act. It was a hate crime. We all have to unite to stop this violence. Tina is a nuclear force for ETVC and the Imperial Court to center around."

"Tina," concluded Mr. Rascher, "would be most impressed to see the concern and participation of all who have come together for her."

Later in the month Cameron contracted pneumonia. He died on the morning of April 21.

Editor's Notes

"THE BEST lack all conviction, while the worst are full of passionate intensity," wrote William Butler Yeats before the days of mediaocracy (or is it "mediocracy?").

The worst in 1939, the year Yeats died, was very bad indeed. It is unlikely that the Age of Television would spawn an aberration such as Hitler. Neither, though, might it be kind to an FDR. It prefers, in this presidential year of 1992, to present us spectacles of dinosaur dancing and mental midget wrestling. Candidates, processed and packaged like supermarket steaks, are all equally tasteless; the best lacking genuine intensity, the worst full of ersatz conviction. Comical in their irrelevance, frightening in their power, presidents and aspirants to the presidency seem more shufflers and destroyers rather than helpers and creators. The real world evolves beyond their control much as the changing weather (or an incoming comet) of the Late Mesozoic lay beyond the control of mighty tyrannosaurus rex.

As we watch the candidates' teleprompted jaws jut, their orchestrated fingers jab and their scripted words hang almost visibly in the air like swamp gas, who can doubt that they are dinosaurs! The question is, are we?

Many who crossdress seem to live in two worlds: An everyday dinosaur world of getting and spending, and a dream world of spending and pretending; the latter a quasi-primitive mammalian existence, scurrying from car to mall to car to bar. Before I begin, I would like to thank Tiffany, Cindy Martin, and Roxanne de Lyon for their contributions to Tapestry issue #60. Tiffany is beautiful, and ETVC can be proud to have her as its representative. The article about ETVC that Cindy and Roxanne wrote was terrific and was exactly what I hoped it would be. Your wonderful organization has much to teach us all.

Now, the reason for my letter. I have received a number of comments and phone calls concerning Roxanne's editorial in Vol. 10 #4 of your newsletter, which prompted me to go back and read the article again. When I read it the first time, my reaction was, "OK, one person's opinion, now let's get on to something interesting, like Renee's article on 'Romancing the Self." When I re-read it, my opinion remained essentially the same, although it seemed like something that would more likely appear in the 'Femme Mirror' than in ETVC's newsletter. It was Roxanne's personal opinion, and I took it as such. She made a few good points, but she also took a few too many swings at the tar baby and got stuck in her own definitions and stereotypes. However, they were her definitions and stereotypes, and she has a right to get stuck in them if that's what she truly wants to do. That doesn't mean I, or anyone else, have to.

I have no intention of debating Roxanne's editorial. However, I do feel qualified and obligated to make a few comments. Most everyone knows I'm a new woman. In fact, when I told my story in Tapestry #59, I caused quite a furor among many members of Tri-Ess and other transsexophobes. *C' est La Vie*! I am now a legal and functional female, and for the first time, in my life my legal documentation is in balance with my mind and my heart. I am also a happy and productive human being, with no hang-ups about my identity or my past. If someone comes up to me and says, "You're not a woman," this is my reply:

"I spent 13 years asking God to fix this; 20 years of misery and looking for a convenient way to die; 17 years of hard work, and over \$50,000 to get where I am. That's one hell of a price to pay for a little peace of mind. I am a woman, and not Virginia, not Roxanne, not anyone is going to tell me otherwise!"

Dear Editor:

It was with some disappointment that I read of Roxanne's departure from the newsletter over her editorial remarks.

In the original editorial, Roxanne stated that "The way to have 100 percent accuracy in marksmanship is to fire the gun first and define the target as the place where the bullet hit." It seems as though the bullet hit a target on another "range" than Roxanne thought she was firing on. While I considered her original "idea" (to be "moderate" or "conservative" in public presentations) to be different than my own (which is in harmony with my own potentials), and to which G.A.L. partially responded to by saying: "Why should we continue to move through life unnoticed[?]"; it seems the bullet pierced an unintended target: Lack of transsexual involvement in ETVC. In lieu of having the transsexually sensitized segment present on the newsletter staff, Roxanne proceeded to "dive" into an abyss of ignorance, a fact she confirmed in the subsequent issue, albeit with a certain "clumsiness."

I do not, in any way, disagree with Christine Beatty's point that it is demeaning to call transsexuals, "men in dresses with their penises cut off;" or that, "being who we are, 'without the need to pretend to be women'" is insensitive to male-to-female transsexuals. Nor do I disagree with the right to speak as expressed by the subsequent letters. In fact, I found the Billie perspective (that of transsexuals speaking from a transsexual perspective) to be an element that has been lacking in previous issues. In my idealistic world, dialogue is far more important than "correctness," whatever that "correctness" might be.

I hope that the dialogue, no matter how "incorrect" it may be, will continue. How else will the messages be delivered?

My friend, Dallas Denny, once told me that several people had told her she was not a transsexual because she did not conform to all the "requirements." Christine, Cacey and James all wrote to voice objections to "transsexual insensitivity." Roxanne wrote about "The Gender Movement" from a non-transsexual, male-woman perspective (or, as she stated, "female mimic"). All of the above are some of the ingredients in the soup some people label as, "the gender movement," which should include every single person in the world, since everyone has a "gender," rather than a few biological white males.

And this, I believe, is the issue all of us should focus more of our energy on: adding ingredients to the soup. Where are the non-whites? Where are the females? Where are the voices of dissent? If they do not come forward, who will drag (pun inevitable) them into the mix?

Maybe more people like Roxanne, who, it might be said, "should be forgiven for she knew not what she said." (But still got results.) I hope that persons with a more transsexually oriented perspective will contribute to ETVC on an ongoing basis, rather than waiting to object to contributing non-transsexuals who display ignorance.


Cameron (Empress XXII Tina) Tanner

March 12, outside the Victoria Theater, Cameron(Tina) Tanner was brutally assaulted by two men with baseball bats. He died on April 21 at 10 AM after lying in a comma for 40 days.

Mr. Cameron was a special friend to ETVC. As Empress XXII Tina, "she was our patron empress," our own Ginny recalled days later in the dining room of her Sunset home. "She was the first person we met in the gay community and a member of ETVC since 1986. She felt comfortable with herself as a crossdresser and a drag queen. It was Tina who got us a table in the '86 coronation and made sure we didn't feel out of place. She was on a panel at our convention in '89."

"Tina was always supportive of ETVC. She would explain to people in the gay community who we were. As manager of Lily's, she opened up the back room for our seminars at no charge. And if we called and said, 'Hey, we forgot to reserve the room,' she just took care of you."

"She raised a lot of money for charity. In everything she did she was a leader, and was loved and supported by all who knew her. This is a terrible loss of someone we liked and who supported us 100%. This terrible assault was insane and we want to do everything we can to stop this insanity."





The Value of Support (reprinted from Devil Woman Newsletter)

Over the years, our country has seen a multitude of support groups emerge, as a variety of behaviors become known and identified. Among these support groups are many for the gender community as we all discover when we find our "first" organization. A plethora of groups from Tri-Ess to ETVC to DVG, just to name a few. And with the growth of gender support groups comes organizations for the wives and partners of these gender-concerned individuals. Many support groups for the wives and partners, called "significant others" or SO's in gender terminology, have proven of great value to those of us living with crossdressing in our lives. The support that we get helps not only the wife or partner to better understand crossdressing, but helps the crossdresser himself to get a more understanding wife.

Wives usually experience a variety of emotions when they first discover their husbands are crossdressers. FEAR: is he gay will he want a sex change; what about the children; what about his job? ANGER: why is this happening to me; why is he doing this? RESENTMENT: why is he spending so much money on clothes, activities, himself; why does he spend so much time on gender activities? EMBARRASSMENT: what will the neighbors think; what about our relatives, friends, etc.?

Coming to support groups gives the wives and partners a chance to express their feelings and find answers to their questions, or support, at least, where there may be no answers. Many wives have found through support groups that they are not alone and that many of their worst fears may be exaggerations.

It is important for crossdressers to be aware of these feelings and try to reassure and help their wives or partners understand their need to crossdress. Crossdressers may need to proceed slowly and not expect too much at once.

Many times when the crossdressser himself finds a support group, he is so relieved to find that he is not alone in this behavior that he goes ALL OUT - leaving his wife behind fearful, angry, and resentful.

Both need to communicate; both need to be aware of the value of compromise. Both need to be aware of the needs of the other and try to understand where the other is coming from. Otherwise, only heartache may lie ahead. -Julie

When Your Woman Wants To Be A Person

In her recent article, Renee Chinquapin makes some astute observations about the limitations our culture places on the type of self-expression appropriate for each gender. However, I feel that her advice and attitudes reinforce destructive gender stereotypes.

While I agree with Chinquapin's basic message that a crossdresser needs sympathetic understanding from his lover, she glosses over the anxiety and confusion that many women feel when they learn about their mate's crossdressing. Her statement that the woman's first step is "to set aside her own anxieties" denies the validity of the woman's concerns at a time when she may feel scared and isolated. Since Chinquapin begins her article by acknowledging the challenges that a woman faces when she learns that her mate is a crossdresser, I am surprised that she does not mention that it can be helpful to discuss her reactions with others in the same situation, such as the ETVC SOS groups, or with a therapist who is familiar with gender issues. As Chinquapin points out, most women have been acculturated to focus on men's needs in relationships. It is dangerously easy to forget to take care of ourselves.

I do not think it is appropriate to refer to men as "lunkheads" or "lugheads." This is gender stereotyping.

I am appalled by Chinquapin's suggestion that a woman might ask for something like a new kitchen in return for her sympathetic understanding. Love is not something to be bargained with. The last thing a crossdresser needs is to be threatened with emotional abandonment. To suggest that any person in any relationship prey upon their partner's fears and insecurity is to advocate emotional treason.

I also feel compelled to take issue with the idea that a man might "help with the household." This implies that the household is the woman's responsibility. Men should not "help" with the household. They should do their share where they live.

Finally, I would like to mention that I, for one, like my lover's silky nightgowns just fine—as long as I don't have to wear them! -Sandy

Point of View

Many wives and partners, after finding out about crossdressing, may in time find support in the form of "significant others" groups. Support groups provide encouragement, knowledge, hope, and eventually may lead to more tolerance and acceptance of gender lifestyles.

Thus it was with great dismay that I read an article, written by a wife who leads a support group in the Midwest, commenting on how transgendered males differ from



"normal" males, particularly within intimate relationships. The writer suggests that transgendered males are not capable of "normal" relationships with their partners—a whopping generalization to be sure! In time, she concludes, the relationship can be satisfactory, but only if the partner will just keep in mind that the crossdresser is "different." I believe the author meant well, but unfortunately the article is not only biased and subjective, but also filled with generalizations and oversimplifications.

For a wife "new" to this lifestyle, such an article could be overwhelming and traumatic. I was more concerned than upset, however, and felt compelled to respond.

Just what is a "normal" male? One who is married, with 2.3 children, a dog, two cars, and living in suburbia? That model went out when the hippies started carousing on Haight and Ashbury. There is probably a wider dichotomy between so-called "normal" males (the jock vs. the nerd, for example) than between transgendered males and so-called "ordinary" guys.

Many crossdressers I have met are able, quite well at times, to blend their male side with the feminine. When dressed, they appear softer, gentler, and more feminine; yet they still exude the power, authority and firmness of their male selves. There is something to be said, isn't there, for a deep voice—it gets the job done.

So rather than cause a rift between a wife and her husband by calling him "different," why not accent the positive—how his "male" mechanical ability to fix a car, dishwasher, lawn mower, etc., is not compromised, but enhanced, when this same ability is utilized to sew a dress, put on makeup and crochet a sweater (considered "feminine" pursuits). Society ironically does accept positively men's ability in the kitchen—but only by referring to them as "chefs." Women are "cooks." The difference in wording supposedly makes this activity acceptable, but we know it all "boils" (excuse the pun) down to the same thing, doesn't it? Articles such as the aforementioned can only lead to division and disharmony in a community which needs all the support it can get to achieve tolerance and understanding. Thus, I decided to respond—something which I really did not want to have to do. -Julie

Moments after getting past my shock about the attack on Cameron Tanner, I was trying to find reasons why he was jumped and why that won't ever happen to me. But I know what the truth is. I know that I am just as vulnerable as Cameron, even if I never go to 16th and Capp.

There are creeps everywhere, even in the suburbs. For example, some of our friends in RGA may recall an incident last year next to the Daybreak in Mountain View, where two men attacked a person in the parking lot. The Chez Mollet is in a quiet area, but there has been at least one car break-in on our meeting nights.

Paying attention to who is around you is the best thing you can do to avoid attack, according to Loretta Whitehead of SAFE (Safety Awareness For Everyone), an expert on personal safety, who spoke to us at the March social.

Among the worst things you can do is to walk around with your head down avoiding people's gaze. You are all but holding up a sign saying "victim." Be aware of your surroundings. Learn to truly see everyone around you and let them know that you see them with brief eye contact. Walk as though you belong and have purpose, not as though you are intimidated. Carry a whistle and while walking to your car have your keys in hand; they make a decent weapon if necessary. If you are getting bad feelings from someone nearby, you should trust those feelings and get out of there. If someone demands your money, do something surprising like throwing your wallet or purse at them and run away, or carry a dummy wallet and throw that. Scream and yell like a lunatic if an attack seems imminent. If attacked, use the hard parts on your body (nails, elbows, etc.) against an assailant's soft parts. Dropping to the ground on your back (yes, on your back), and yelling for help while kicking at his crotch with your heels (the spikier, the better) is also effective.

"Learning self-defense techniques is a very good idea," said Ms. Whitehead, "but if that isn't possible at least learn how to see what is going on around you."

THE EVER-IMPROVING *Cross-Talk* newsletter in LA really let the IFGE have it after issue #59, which featured 22 pages of text and photos describing IFGE Executive Director Merissa Sherill Lynn's reassignment surgery. The criticism was well deserved, since the *Tapestry* is supposed to be the voice of a national organization, not a vanity press for one individual.

But I'll say this about Merissa and IFGE: they do respond to criticism rather well. The latest was a vast improvement over recent ones that have been notably weak on transvestite material. Of course it helped a lot that #60 features our own Tiffany, Miss ETVC 1990, on the cover, and that a 3500 word story about ETVC was given good play (the two authors of the story really seem intelligent, too!). Frankly, I think our story could have been told in about a quarter of the length, but IFGE wanted a very long article. By the way, *Cross-Talk* is really worth its \$24 per year subscription price if you want to know what is going on around the country. Check it out by writing to Cross-Talk, P.O. Profile: Thalia Gravel

Thanks to the amazingly energetic Thalia Gravel our organization now has the finest Speaker's Bureau in the nation. From a modest start in 1988 when the group made five presentations to last year when our people spoke to more than 40 organizations and college audiences, Thalia has made the Speaker's Bureau into one of the most important forms of outreach our club has. Thalia has also been instrumental in professionalizing our telephone Hotline and was the reason ETVC was highlighted in a three-part series on transvestites in 1989 that was aired on KTVU-TV Channel 2.

Q: How do people react to crossdressers when they come into their classroom or meeting place?

Thalia Gravel: If a crossdresser slinks into a room and doesn't respond to the people around her then people will think that she's nuts. But if you walk in and engage people and are well-behaved then people think you're a rational person and they won't do anything dumb...they don't want to do or say anything that makes them seem less than socialized.

I've seen it so many times in classrooms. If we are calm, likable and direct the class won't allow someone to get out of line. If they do, the class will turn on them.

It's a cliche, but passing does come down to attitude. And what is passing? If you're 6'2" and rough-looking but you want people to call you Marilyn, they will as long as you are rational and appear well-behaved and fit into the role that you are presenting. On the other hand, you can have someone who is truly beautiful, but if they come off with an attitude expecting male privilege or if you act paranoid, that will overcome any beauty you have.

Q: How do community organizations respond to our presenters?

Thalia: I was giving a talk to a Rotary Club recently and they were asking a lot of really good questions...but I think what really interested them was the notion that someone's gender identity could be different from their body...I read to them from a survey done of ETVC members and told them that most of the people were white middle class, middle-aged men and that they were accountants and businessmen and so on and I joked that it sounded a lot like Rotary.

I think, too, that the respectability of the people (in ETVC) was surprising to them. They just didn't know that we weren't all down in the Tenderloin.

They were also really interested in how we compartmentalized our lives. They wanted to know how we manage our lives. They wanted to know how you can think like both a man and a woman.

Q: Do you get any sense that people are thinking more about male and female roles?

TG: There is no question that as women have moved into managerial roles that some men are starting to look at their assumptions a little more closely because they have to. We tend to catalyze things and bring some of these issues into focus.

On the other hand, we threaten some young men because they are very resentful of weird people who can get along in the world while they are having a hard time. That makes no sense to this kind of guy and makes him frustrated and mad.

Q: What kind of questions do students ask?

TG: You get a wide range but you often hear from women the question "Now that you have taken on this (female) role don't you find it a pain in the ass?" Women have to worry about security, about not being listened to and so on, things men don't give a thought to...then there is always one woman with feet as large as mine who'll ask "Oh, do you get yours at...?" Then there is always the bathroom question...They also find the fact that ETVC exists very interesting. That there is a social outlet that isn't some back alley comes as a surprise to many of them.

Q: Do you notice whether people are more tolerant and accepting than say four years ago when you started the bureau?

TG: No. I think they have their heads turned around after one of our presentations, but there is a lot of lack of knowledge and stereotypical thinking. Crossdressing is where gay liberation was 25 years ago...I'm sorry to say this, but we probably need to have a few martyrs if we are going to move forward...Also I think that transvestites have a much tougher (image to correct) than transsexuals. The reason is there are no TV models for success, but there have been TS models that the public knows about.

Q: What has been the most rewarding part of being involved with public speaking?

TG: I've seen amazing growth in some of the people who make our presentations...in the process of answering questions they learned something about themselves and that really is great.

Note – When Thalia became head of the ETVC Speaker's Bureau, she put her career as a graphic artist on the back burner. Thanks to the recession, the burner is off. ETVC needs Thalia and Thalia needs work. If you can help with a job lead call her at (510) – Ed.



Most of us are addicts.


We abuse alcohol, drugs, food, caffeine, nicotine, gambling, television and sex in an effort to avoid uncomfortable feelings. We may drink to cover up our shyness, eat to fill an inner emptiness, watch television to avoid relating to our families, or we may work ourselves to death trying to overcome an inner sense of inadequacy. Addiction is compulsive, destructive and insidious, because we try to deny its existence until it frays or destroys the fabric of our lives.

Is crossdressing just another addictive behavior? It can be, depending on how it is done.

Crossdressing is an unconscious attempt to contact, explore, enjoy and eventually integrate the disowned anima or animus archetypes, sources of great wisdom and energy in the shadow world of the unconscious. It is not shameful or depraved, but a wonderful means for enriching life with heretofore repressed creative and spiritual energies.

Crossdressing is addictive when kept locked behind closed doors in order to avoid deeper feelings, such as fear and envy of the opposite sex. Then it becomes a kinky, shameful secret, much the same as bingeing on ice cream after the family's gone to bed. Although, like adolescent masturbation, it may relieve stress and provide a forbidden fruit sort of kick, it can be as lonely, fetishistic, guilt ridden and abortive as any other addictive compulsion.

For crossdressing to be a healthy behavior, it needs to come out of the closet. It can take place in a Mardi Gras/ Halloween/ Gay Pride Parade context, or with other crossgendered folks at

semi-public gatherings, like RGA, ETVC or FTM support groups, or just out shopping with a friend or lover. The point is to learn to integrate the lessons that each crossdresser's anima/animus can teach. The animus might teach a female to walk tall, be assertive, and not worry what men think of her. The anima can teach a man to listen better, to treat himself and others more gently, and to smell the flowers.

When it is shared, when it goes public, when it becomes an accepted part of life, the way a lesbian or gay eventually comes out of the closet with pride and relief, then crossdressing loses its compulsivity and becomes the balancing agent it was meant to be. Men will begin to understand women and the womanly part of themselves. Women, literally standing in men's shoes, will begin to understand their own power and what it is really like to be a man.

What makes this so devilishly difficult is the rigid cultural myth that men and women are entirely different creatures, doomed to mutual misunderstanding and aggravation. The media reinforces this by endlessly bombarding us with images of macho men and their coy, busty, adoring women. One is either this or that, and anything in between is generally ridiculed, unless it is a charismatic millionaire like Michael Jackson, who can get away with gender bending. Talk shows do provide alternative gender role models, but unfortunately remind one more of traveling circus freak shows in a Mark Twain novel than respectful attempts at breaking down stereotypes.

Men and women *are* different. But we all have within us elements of the opposite gender, which is something to be proud of, not ashamed. There are as many ways to express the contragender aspect of self as there are individuals ready to embark on this scary but rewarding endeavor. Some folks express it through crossgender dressing and behavior. They always have and they always will, and it seems as viable a way as any other.

If, however, a crossdresser feels that she or he must drink or get stoned in order to feel authentic in the opposite gender role, it is time to seek support from friends, family, peers or a professional. To crossdress secretly while stoned or tipsy is like dressing in the closet with the light turned off, an addiction within an addiction, and a sad testament to the strength of society's internalized taboos. To distort the crossdressing experience with substance abuse invalidates and trivializes the lessons it has to teach about self-acceptance, self-love and integration.


BOY, WHAT A GIRL! Starring Tim Moore.


