Tres Bizarre...A girl in town for the Tri-Ess Holiday En Femme reported that there are therapists in the Upper Midwest who are recommending a "12 step" program to "cure" crossdressing.

Now I'm just a layman and certainly no expert on psychological theory, but the idea that TVs are "addicted" to crossdressing seems absurd on its face. To me there would appear to be a large difference between the person who abuses drugs like cocaine or alcohol or nicotine and someone who is compelled to put on a dress. Drug addiction will kill you. It also cannot be denied that some people use dressing as a way to escape life's knocks. Some people go fishing or play tennis or go shopping for the same reason. You can overdo anything, of course, but there is a world of difference between an avid golfer and a drug addict killing herself slowly with chemicals. Keep it in perspective ladies...

Onward...A very important series of bylaws changes are going to be put before members attending the January 25 meeting. One would permit absentee balloting for bylaw changes and officer elections.

The other has to do with the basic structure of the club and its committees. You will be asked, in effect, to give the Social Committee autonomy in deciding what events it will stage.

This is a change from current bylaws which state that both the general membership and the Executive Committee, comprised of all club officers and committee chairs, have to authorize the themes for socials.

There are several implications to such a change. On the one hand, it will eliminate a cumbersome process and allow the social committee greater flexibilities to decide what events to stage. On the other hand, it will remove some of the oversight authority for socials now vested in the members and the Executive Committee.

Consider your vote carefully.

The answer to this was a resounding assertion that many mountains remain to be climbed with untold vistas yet unseen. Much more outreach remains ahead for all of us.

Being an outreach chairperson has brought a whole new excitement to my public and private life. The joy at seeing the shining look in the eyes of new arrivals at the Chez when they sense the acceptance and approval of who they are, as they are, is gratifying to say the least.

Stepping out into the chill of the early AM (8:25) at the Concourse our anticipation grew. Opera in the Park isn't for everybody, but for Kate and me, we were ready for an enjoyable time. We, by far, were not the first people to arrive for the day. We had to choose the "right" location to see and be seen. Fortunately there were still some good open spaces in which to spread our blanket and set up chairs.

We were now ready to wait for the festivities to begin amid the cool breeze that circulated around our legs and blew gently at our hair. "Showtime" was to be at 2 PM. A newspaper boy sold us a special opera edition of the Examiner so we had plenty of reading matter to occupy our time. Shortly, a group of three fellows came and spread out their blanket in front of us. They smiled as if to indicate acceptance of and knowledge of what we were. Soon we were all discussing a variety of worldly subjects including our particular preference to be transvestites. Your reporter is an old hand at breaking the ice in this type of situation.

The cool breeze continued to chill our bodies but not our spirits. At about 10 AM the outreach opportunity of the day occurred. A new couple squeezed in to our left and set up their area. The lady smiled approvingly at both Kate and me. A little while later, yours truly, turned to this lady and asked if she had had the opportunity to meet any crossdressers up close and personal. No, was the answer, but she was very interested in learning more about us and why we were there, etc.

Katherine was her name and Don, her husband's name. She told us that she was presently in an intern program for her MFCC degree. Well, Kate & I, of course, gushed out all over her after learning this important fact. The remaining hours before the concert passed in a flash. We gave her a couple of our newsletters, cards and flyers about ETVC and asked her to use them to introduce us to her instructors at school, assuring her of our desire to conduct speaking engagements for their classes.

A female friend of ETVC, Susan S., recently posed a series of questions about crossdressing in an open letter to ETVC members. In the last newsletter, we published responses to the first four of her questions. Here are some responses to her last four questions:

1. *When you decide to go out alone to shop or do some other activity what triggers the need to go out dressed. How are you feeling then and how do you feel when you get back home?*

"I have no idea what triggers the need. And by the way I don't consider it a "need." It's a lifestyle preference! Nonetheless getting ready to go out is great fun: almost like going on stage for a magic show. The challenge is to see how well I pass. My guess is that I pass maybe 20% of the time, but I don't know which 20%." —Janelle

"I don't know what triggers the need to go out dressed, only that I need to do so. I suspect that a lot of it may be opportunity. I don't know as a matter of certainty, but I think I would be dressed the majority of the time if I could, I just don't have the chance...I feel the same way in both circumstances (home and out) - happy, content and comfortable." —Carolyn

"I only know that the more I do get the opportunity to (dress) the more I enjoy it and more natural I feel in "exposing" Judy to her public. While out I don't feel anything strange at all. My mode of dress is hopefully what anybody who glances at me would expect from me at this time and in this place. And, when I get back home, I'm thrilled that Judy has done it again. My only regret is "pumpkin time." —Judy

2. *Do you want to be in a traditional women's role such as nurturing or child care or is dressing as far as it goes?*

"If 'traditional women's role' is limited to nurturing and child care, absolutely not! I think my children would agree that I've done a good share of nurturing and caring..." —Janelle

"I am already in a "traditional women's role." My wife commutes a long distance. She leaves early and gets home late. I am the one who primarily tends to the needs, emotional and physical, of our child - a job I highly recommend." —Carolyn

"As a teacher, I feel as though I'm already involved in a profession overwhelmingly held by women. However, I have not as yet acquired the desires associated with nurturing a child...I plan to continue teaching till I'm carried from the classroom kicking and screaming that I'm not ready for retirement yet!" —Judy

3. *What kind of response would you like from women?*

"I'd like to be regarded as simply another human being. A human being with the same hopes, fears, insecurities, vanities, weaknesses, desires, and dreams as other human beings. What we wear are only the props for the social charade that has developed over thousands of years." —Janelle

"The best response I could get from other women is none at all - to have them simply not realize there is anything different about me. As to those who know there is a male body in there, I would like their reaction to be one of acceptance. I present myself as a woman, I need to be accepted that way, and I would like them to do just that." —Carolyn

"The response I'd most cherish from women would be that of support. I'd hope that they would see in me a fellow human being - (a woman, but for the accident of birth) - who like them is most concerned with the betterment of our fellow human beings — our future Americans, who today are in our care, in our classrooms." —Judy

4. *What would you tell a woman who is new to all this.*

"I'd be reluctant to "tell" her anything. What we'd have to do is agree to go on a journey—side by side—of discovery, much the way explorers venture out. These kinds of adventures are difficult. I'm not sure what we'll discover. We might discover that, in the final analysis, we're people." —Janelle

"First, that the people she is seeing are those who have a very strong need to express an important aspect of their personalities. The need is so strong that we risk being ridiculed by others who hold dear that societal norm which requires that men never display feminine qualities. Further, that crossdressing is a very harmless way to express our needs...Above all I would ask her to reserve judgment on it and see if she can come to accept us for what we are - people with a need." —Carolyn

"That like her I am a human being with all the foibles of a human being! I have the hopes and desires of us all. I'm reasonably intelligent and want to see peace and justice in our time too! ...I love expressing the feminine part of my nature. But, unfortunately, our culture is less than encouraging when men try to emulate all that is wholesome in women. Hence, Judy has evolved with Jim into a complex being over these past 60 years. They have disavowed the guilt once carried as teenagers and have accepted each other as simply components of the whole. They are aware of their innate goodness; and are happy to be able to share of it. Hopefully, the world will be a better place for their being there." —Judy



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The instructions said, "Check in at the Hotel Californian then register in the hospitality suite." I knew I would have a roommate, but did not know who. When I checked in, I saw the other name on the reservation sheet, but it did not mean anything to me then. I walked up one flight of stairs to the room where I was to check in with Tri-Ess. There I first met a wonderful lady, Diane Ingram. I was a little early as I had arrived at about 11:15 a.m. Off to my room to change and let Janette come alive.

Dressed in a nice purple, very proper, lady's business suit, Janette felt like a million dollars. I went back down and registered for the holiday and was assisted by another nice gal, Terri, from Phoenix. When my roommate walked in, I was extremely happy to see a lady we all know, Donna Freeman. I knew we would have a great four days.

Each afternoon there was a tea at 4 p.m. with a different topic. The first was traveling en femme and the experiences related by the sisters were great. That evening was the welcome party and Janette tried to meet everyone but was so fascinated with everything that it was difficult to meet all.

Thursday afternoon was my scheduled time for a makeup session with Jim Bridges, a professional makeup artist from Hollywood. I really felt pampered. A trip to a local high class French restaurant for dinner was great. The people there treated me like the lady I felt I was in my beautiful evening clothes. The ETVC Hotline is 415-763-3959. Questions have been asked about its purpose. It is not a sex-talk line, nor a dating service, nor do we make referrals to therapists or to third parties who want long conversations. We do try to offer information about ETVC, its events and the location and events of similar groups in this area. The callers include crossdressers, their partners, families, helping professionals, the media and anyone else who gets the number. We advertise widely, as well as using the number in official mailings and in resource lists such as the Tapestry. If you call, you will usually hear a recording of coming events, most taken straight from their calendar, followed by a request to leave your number if you want to be contacted. And within a few days this will be done. Several days of the week we have a live person answering from 7 to 10 PM. Many times I've been unable to reach anyone at the number left, so we

want as much live contact as possible, which means volunteers. Surprisingly, we have enough now, but want more for backups. Contact me if you are interested in being a hotline volunteer. The telephone is an expensive, time-consuming item for the club, but necessary both as a first point of contact for newcomers, and a way for anyone in the country, including ETVC members to reach a knowledgeable person when there isn't time to write.

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This column is the second in a three-part series on things I have learned from my transsexual experiences. Part one dealt with setting goals and modifying behavior. This part deals with your appearance.

The appearance challenge is this: How does one take a basic male body and transform it into a passable and attractive female body? We begin by looking at the differences in physical appearance between men and women.

It is important to keep in mind those secondary sexual characteristics that are created by testosterone, those that are the result of the absence of testosterone and those that are created by estrogen.

First in general, men have a larger bone structure than women. The female bone structure is the way a person develops in the absence of testosterone. The testosterone in a maturing male causes the bone structure to grow in the male direction. This includes your facial bones, shoulders, arms, legs, feet and hands. Women also tend to have wider pelvis bones and a wider pelvic cavity. Plastic surgeons can alter facial contours to some extent, but most of the bone structure is something with which you will have to live. There are many women who are also large boned. You, like them, will need to learn clothing styles that flatter your figure and avoid those that emphasize your deficiencies.

Testosterone causes the facial and body hair to develop in the male direction and can cause male pattern baldness. These are all things that estrogen, the basic female hormone cannot change once a male has passed through puberty. The one possible exception is that the lack of testosterone may change your body hair in the female direction. Also, with the absence of testosterone, male pattern baldness should be arrested. My endocrinologist told me that it was her opinion that male pattern baldness is arrested in about six months on her prescription. Today, there are plastic surgery techniques that can be used to modify the pattern of hair distribution.

Whether it is the lack of testosterone or the influx of estrogens, the skin gets smoother with female hormones. Pores get smaller. Another thing that sometimes does change with estrogen is muscle mass and physical strength. I noticed a definite reduction in the size of my arms and shoulders. Typically, with the taking of estrogens, you should see some breast development. How much will depend on your prescription and on your heredity. If

your breast development is small, you may want to consider breast enlargement surgery. Finally, estrogen will tend to change your body fat distribution in the female direction. However, for me this progress has been the slowest. After 20 months on estrogen I now can see a definite change in my hip and thigh contours, but it has taken a long time.

If you plan on taking female hormones, do so only under a physician's care. You can kill yourself. Also, remember, more is not better. There are no guarantees. Each individual will react differently. Also, most people experience some change in emotional makeup and some may experience mood swings. This varies by the individual, but keep in mind that the process of becoming a woman involves both your body and your soul.

For most of us, electrolysis to remove facial and possibly body hair is a must. It is a long, painful, expensive process. However, the reward will ultimately be the elimination of the close shave that never really gets it all. A five o'clock shadow is a dead giveaway to TS's who try to cross-live with little or no electrolysis. Believe me, it will be enough to put on a little makeup in the morning before going to work. And that is another reward, a little or no makeup and out the door. It tends to be validating. My electrologist is Carole Young and she has considerable experience doing TS's. Electrolysis with someone who does not know what they are doing can permanently damage your skin.

Even with electrolysis and hormones you still may not pass your own standards for femininity if your face has strong masculine contours. In this case you may want to consider cosmetic surgery. Male secondary sexual characteristics may include a larger nose, extended brow bone, wide jaw bone, extended chin or an Adam's apple. There are reputable plastic surgeons who are experienced in dealing with these areas. I have seen some remarkable results. So have you, if you come to ETVC periodically.

You should know that most sexual reassignment surgeons will not accept you as a patient if you are over a certain weight limit for your heart. You need to consider health regimens that will help create the you that you want to be.

Smoking is disastrous for anyone, but for a woman it's worse. Besides shortening your life, smoking is terrible for your skin. Look at the skin of people who smoke heavily, especially around the eyes, and you will see the characteristic wrinkling effect.

Also, the chemicals in cigarettes are dangerous in combination with the hormones. So whatever it takes, quit. The future woman in you will thank you someday.

Last year when I sat down and set my goals, one of them was to have a firm, healthy, fit body. I resolved to take an exercise class, but it took me awhile to develop the courage to go to an aerobics class. Doing dancing steps while scantily dressed in front of almost exclusively other women similarly dressed is a real test. I was nervous the first time, but I seemed to do okay, so I went a second time and so forth. I have now put in many hours and feel that these sessions have done me much good. I want to be in the best possible condition for SRS surgery. Besides there are other benefits like muscle toning, the sheer fun of dance, the grace that you learn in the movements as you copy other women and finally, I find it validating to me as a woman. The female instructor talks to the class in subject matter and language that is exclusively for women.



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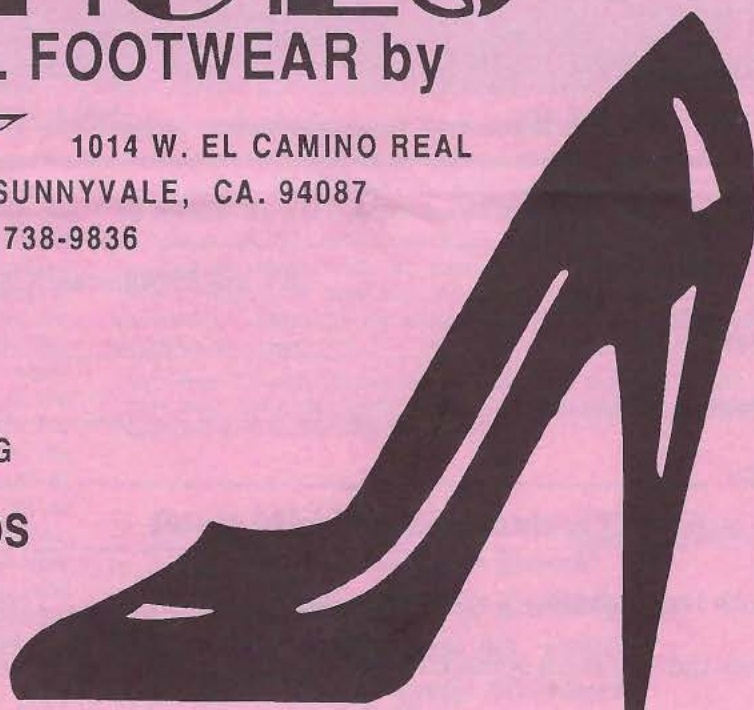
